COMPREHENSIVE REPORT OF THE ACTIVITY ON THE INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR PERSON WITH DISABILITIES (IDD) December 3, 2023

Introduction:

Sensitization and Education: Continuous efforts in educating the public to combat stereotypes, stigma, and discrimination against people with disabilities are essential for fostering inclusivity.

Policy Advocacy: Collaborating with policymakers to develop and implement comprehensive policies that safeguard the rights and ensure the inclusion of individuals with disabilities in all spheres of life.

School support: increase the number of beneficiaries of the school support in the kabala school for the blind
